### Rediscovering a Banner Year

Walking the familiar paths near the Denver Harbor baseball park, Leroy Cervantes thought he was just stretching his legs on an ordinary day. Instead, he stumbled upon a piece of neighborhood history—a crumpled white bundle tossed on a pile of rubble near an old concession stand.

"I wasn't sure what it was at first," Leroy recalled. "But when I folded some of it back and saw the letters, I recognized it. It was the banner." He scooped it up, put it in his car to keep it safe, and brought it home.

That banner, faded but still proud, was from the 1974 Denver Harbor Little League All-Stars champions of District 25. For Leroy, the find was more than chance. It was personal. He had served as assistant coach of that very team 51 years ago.

### Glory Days

The summer of 1974 marked a milestone for Denver Harbor. For the first time, its Little League All-Star team clinched the district title, advancing farther than any local team had gone before. Under manager Arthur Gonzalez and assistant Leroy Cervantes, the boys beat Spring Branch, Lindale, and then Forest Cove in the championship.

Leroy smiles when he recalls walking into a ballpark with his team dressed in sharp, nearly new uniforms. A man in the bleachers called out, "I don't know if they can play ball, but they sure look pretty." Leroy laughs now, knowing those same boys went on to shower cars in the parking lot with home runs.

# Meet the New Principals in Our Neighborhood Schools'

Principals from Pugh, McReynolds, and Martinez share their stories, hopes, and plans for success.

**Denver Harbor** is welcoming three new school leaders this year, each bringing a unique blend of experience, energy, and passion to the neighborhood. **Jeanette Cortez** is the new leader at **Pugh Elementary**, **Dr. Kenisha Spears Richardson** takes the helm at **McReynolds Middle**, and **Jaime Moretti Jr.** heads up **Raul C. Martinez Elementary**. All three spoke with La Voz about their personal journeys, their enthusiasm for new programs and community partnerships, and their plans to collaborate with families to help students succeed. These three leaders have also previously collaborated with each other; Richardson and Cortez were in the same apprentice principal program, and Moretti and Richardson worked together at the Sam Houston Math, Science, and Technology Center.

## Dr. Kenisha Spears Richardson — McReynolds Middle School



With **19 years of experience in Houston ISD**, Dr. Kenisha Richardson has served as a teacher development specialist, assistant principal, and one of the district's first principal apprentices. She has also led campuses to higher achievement, including a dramatic turnaround at Highland Heights Elementary, which had been rated an F for nine consecutive years before her team lifted it to an 87. Most recently, she served as principal of Marshall Elementary, where the school advanced from a solid B to an even stronger 85 rating. Richardson said she literally shed joyful tears when she received news of the results, because the work is so hard.

McReynolds is entering its second year as a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) magnet school, with its first class of students already proving the power of hands-on learning in robotics and science. She has also expanded opportunities for high school credit, adding courses in Geometry, Spanish, and Information Technology alongside Algebra I. **"When students leave McReynolds, they'll be just two and a half credits shy of sophomore standing,"** she explained. **"When they get to high school, that will catapult them even further to entering a P-TECH campus, or being able to get those college credits while they're in high school, where it's cheaper."**

Richardson emphasizes, **"We're building a legacy."**

Outside of school, Richardson still finds time for sports and family.

A former college volleyball player, she recently returned to competitive play as a way to recharge. She also enjoys fantasy football and caring for her two dogs, but her greatest joy is her family, which now includes three grandchildren and a fourth on the way.

## Jaime Moretti Jr. — Raul C. Martinez Elementary School



Raised in Houston and educated in HISD schools, Principal Jamie Moretti Jr. built his career at Sam Houston High, spending ten years as a teacher and administrator. He later moved to Northline Elementary, where his team achieved a ten-point rating increase in just one year.

Like his colleagues at neighboring schools, Moretti is working with parents to re-establish a PTO after several years of inactivity.



### Requirements:



# Rediscovering a Banner Year

The Denver Harbor News headline of July 25, 1974, told it all:

**"LL All-Star Take Dist. Title, Aim at State Win."**

For the neighborhood, it was a moment of pride. For the players, David Almendarez, Reginald Barnett, Frank Cardenas, Leroy Cervantes Jr., Benny Chavez, John Chomiak, John Cook, Mario Gonzales, Greg Gonzalez, Joe Martinez, Ray Melchor, Sonny Moreno, Mickey Ochoa, Tim Phillips, Carlton Rocio, Edward Suarez, Henry Torres, and Albert Villanueva—it was the summer of their lives.

"We practiced them like any other team," Leroy remembered.

**"But when we got into that tournament, something came out of those kids. They just had it."**

He said,

**"It wasn't a miracle. It was just those kids, and what they carried inside them. I was proud then, and I'm proud now."**

Tournaments in those days were unforgiving. "Now they play double elimination," Leroy explained. "But back then, it was one loss and you were out. No safety net." After sweeping through the district, Denver Harbor moved on to the sectional playoffs. Their remarkable run ended there, with a tough loss to Pasadena that cut short their dream of reaching State.



## A Coincidental Discovery

Leroy never really left the game. After his years as a coach, he stayed involved in softball and later became a certified umpire. In fact, he was still certified last year, when he turned 89. Leroy hadn't thought much about that banner in decades when he found it by accident, half-buried in trash. "No, I couldn't leave it there," he said. "That wasn't right."

He tucked the banner away for safekeeping, unsure what to do with it. Eventually, he decided to pass it on to Carolyn Lopez. Her father, Ralph Lopez, served as president of Denver Harbor Little League back in '74.



## More to come

Early energy is already turning into plans for events, incentives, and teacher support. Moretti said, “**It’s a good feeling to be able to know that they want to come in.**” He adds, “**We want to do this together with the community and make sure that we are providing everything for students.**”

Outside of school, Moretti is a sports enthusiast — an Astros fan, basketball player, and former mariachi musician who performed for nearly 15 years. Today, most of his time is spent with his wife, a teacher in Humble ISD, and their two children, who are actively involved in soccer and gymnastics.

Moretti describes his proudest moments as those when students tell him directly that his support has made a difference. At Sam Houston, seniors shook his hand after graduation and said, “**If it wasn’t for you, I wouldn’t be here.**” Those moments, he said, “**remind me that the work we do is important, even if you don’t see it every day.**”

Looking to the future, Moretti said, “**We’re going to do what’s in our power to make sure that we get these kids in a good position to get to that next level.**”

### Jeanette Cortez — Pugh Elementary School



For Principal Jeanette Cortez, leading Pugh Elementary is both a professional and personal endeavor. A graduate of Houston ISD schools herself, Cortez is proud to now serve the community she grew up in, where her own nephew is a student, and her mother is an active volunteer. She began her career in elementary education but also served in middle and high schools. At Waltrip High, she stepped up as interim principal and helped raise the school’s rating from 69 to 89 in just ten months, earning six distinctions. Later, at Booker T. Washington High School, she and her team lifted the campus to a B rating and achieved 97% College, Career, and Military Readiness (CCMR) points.

At Pugh, Cortez is building momentum around new initiatives. The school is preparing to become a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) campus, with plans to expand into agriculture. Cortez said that the school is working through partnerships to bring on digital art. “**We have the equipment, and we’re now just looking for the person.**”

Cortez is also excited about parental involvement. Just weeks into the school year, Pugh parents have already established a new PTO board, bringing energy back into the school community. “We’re now rocking and rolling with coffee with the principal,” she said. “**Parents are telling me it feels like they’re welcomed again.**”

Cortez describes her work as both a passion and a calling. Whether she is taking a long walk in Memorial Park or walking the campus halls with student data in hand, her focus is steady: building a school where every child feels seen and supported.

On a more personal level, Cortez speaks for many other educators when she says, “**We’re in this. This is not just a job. This is not just a career; this is our calling. God has called us to do this type of work.**”

## Shining a Light on Literacy: Dr. Gabriela Baeza Ventura's Vision for a Reading Renaissance


In celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month and Literacy Awareness Month, La Voz proudly highlights Dr. Gabriela Baeza Ventura, a leading advocate for Latino literature and cultural preservation. As the director of Arte Público Press and a University of Houston professor, Dr. Ventura has dedicated her career to ensuring that Latino stories are not just told but cherished.

Dr. Ventura emphasized that one of the most urgent missions is to revive a culture of reading within the Latino community. She passionately advocates for parents to read to their children, to share stories that reflect their heritage, and to create a home environment where books are treasured.


Her message is clear: by encouraging reading from a young age, we can foster a generation that sees literacy as a source of strength and identity. She also pointed out the importance of having physical spaces, libraries, where children and families can discover books that resonate with their own experiences.

In her words, it's about changing the culture back to one where literacy is a shared family value and a pillar of community life.

As part of our conversation, Dr. Ventura shared some of her favorite titles published by Arte Público Press, stories that reflect the richness and resilience of Latino experiences:




- **Pepita Talks Twice by Ofelia Dumas Lachtman** A children's book about a bilingual girl who decides she won't translate for her family anymore, only to realize the power and importance of being bilingual.



- **The Vincent Ventura Detective Series by Xavier Garza** A young adult series that reimagines folk tales and urban legends like La Llorona and the Donkey Lady in contemporary ways.

- **Song of the Hummingbird by Graciela Limón** An adult novel retelling the story of the Spanish conquest from the perspective of an Indigenous woman, offering a powerful counter-narrative to colonial history.



So as we celebrate this month, let's take Dr. Ventura's inspiration to heart: let's open a book, read to our kids, and help build a future where every child sees themselves as part of the story.



# Conozca a los Nuevos Directores en Nuestras Escuelas del Vecindario

**Los directores de Pugh, McReynolds y Martinez comparten sus historias, esperanzas y planes para el éxito.**

Denver Harbor da la bienvenida este año a tres nuevos líderes escolares, cada uno aportando una combinación única de experiencia, energía y pasión al vecindario. Jeanette Cortez es la nueva directora de Pugh Elementary, la Dra. Kenisha Spears Richardson asume el liderazgo en McReynolds Middle, y Jaime Moretti Jr. encabeza la primaria Raul C. Martinez. Los tres hablaron con La Voz sobre sus trayectorias personales, su entusiasmo por nuevos programas y asociaciones comunitarias, y sus planes de colaborar con las familias para ayudar a los estudiantes a tener éxito. Estos tres líderes también han colaborado previamente entre sí; Richardson y Cortez participaron en el mismo programa de aprendizaje para directores, y Moretti y Richardson trabajaron juntos en el Sam Houston Math, Science, and Technology Center.

## Dra. Kenisha Spears Richardson — McReynolds Middle School



Con 19 años de experiencia en Houston ISD, la Dra. Kenisha Richardson se ha desempeñado como especialista en desarrollo docente, subdirectora y una de las primeras aprendices de director en el distrito. También ha liderado escuelas hacia logros más altos, incluyendo una transformación en Highland Heights Elementary, que había recibido una calificación de F durante nueve años consecutivos antes de que su equipo la elevara a un 87. Más recientemente, fue directora de Marshall Elementary, donde la escuela avanzó de una B sólida a una calificación aún más fuerte de 85. Richardson dijo que literalmente lloró de alegría al recibir la noticia de los resultados, porque el trabajo es muy duro.

McReynolds entra en su segundo año como escuela magnet STEM (Ciencia, Tecnología, Ingeniería y Matemáticas), con su primera generación de estudiantes ya demostrando el poder del aprendizaje práctico en robótica y ciencias. También ha ampliado las oportunidades de créditos de preparatoria, agregando cursos en Geometría, Español y Tecnología de la Información junto con Álgebra I. “Cuando los estudiantes salgan de McReynolds, estarán a solo dos créditos y medio de ser considerados sophomores”, explicó. “Cuando lleguen a la preparatoria, eso los impulsará aún más para entrar en un campus P-TECH o poder obtener créditos universitarios mientras están en la preparatoria, donde es más económico.”

Richardson enfatiza: “Estamos construyendo un legado.” Fuera de la escuela, Richardson aún encuentra tiempo para los deportes y la familia. Exjugadora universitaria de voleibol, recientemente regresó a la

competencia como una forma de recargar energías. También disfruta del fútbol de fantasía y de cuidar a sus dos perros, pero su mayor alegría es su familia, que ahora incluye tres nietos y un cuarto en camino.

## Jaime Moretti Jr. — Raul C. Martinez Elementary School



Criado en Houston y educado en las escuelas de HISD, el director Jaime Moretti Jr. construyó su carrera en Sam Houston High, donde pasó diez años como maestro y administrador. Luego se trasladó a Northline Elementary, donde su equipo logró un aumento de diez puntos en la calificación en solo un año.

Al igual que sus colegas en las escuelas vecinas, Moretti está trabajando con los padres para restablecer una PTO después de varios años de inactividad. El entusiasmo inicial ya se está convirtiendo en planes para eventos, incentivos y apoyo a los maestros. Moretti dijo: “Es una buena sensación poder saber que quieren participar.” Agregó:

## Encendiendo la Lectura: La visión de la Dra. Gabriela Baeza Ventura para un Futuro de Lectores




También habló de la importancia de tener espacios físicos, las bibliotecas, donde los niños y las familias puedan encontrar libros que hablen de sus propias experiencias.



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

# In The Community | En La Comunidad





Fuera de la escuela, Moretti es un entusiasta del deporte: fanático de los Astros, jugador de baloncesto y exmúsico de mariachi que actuó durante casi 15 años. Hoy en día, pasa la mayor parte de su tiempo con su esposa, maestra en Humble ISD, y sus dos hijos, que participan activamente en el fútbol y la gimnasia.

Moretti describe sus momentos más orgullosos como aquellos en los que los estudiantes le dicen directamente que su apoyo ha marcado la diferencia. En Sam Houston, los graduados le estrechaban la mano después de la ceremonia y decían: “Si no fuera por usted, no estaría aquí.” Esos momentos, dijo, “me recuerdan que el trabajo que hacemos es importante, incluso si no se ve todos los días.”

De cara al futuro, Moretti dijo: “Vamos a hacer lo que esté en nuestro poder para asegurarnos de que pongamos a estos niños en una buena posición para llegar al siguiente nivel.”

### **Jeanette Cortez — Pugh Elementary School**



Para la directora Jeanette Cortez, liderar Pugh Elementary es tanto un esfuerzo profesional como personal. Graduada de las escuelas de HISD, Cortez ahora se enorgullece de servir a la comunidad donde creció, donde su propio sobrino es estudiante y su madre es una voluntaria activa. Comenzó su carrera en la educación primaria pero también trabajó en escuelas intermedias y secundarias. En Waltrip High, asumió el cargo de directora interina y ayudó a elevar la calificación de la escuela de 69 a 89 en solo diez meses, obteniendo seis distinciones. Más tarde, en Booker T. Washington High School, ella y su equipo elevaron la calificación del campus a una B y alcanzaron el 97% en puntos de Preparación Universitaria, Profesional y Militar (CCMR).

En Pugh, Cortez está generando impulso en torno a nuevas iniciativas. La escuela se prepara para convertirse en un campus STEAM (Ciencia, Tecnología, Ingeniería, Artes y Matemáticas), con planes de expandirse hacia la agricultura. Cortez dijo que la escuela está

trabajando en asociaciones para incorporar arte digital. “Tenemos el equipo, y ahora estamos buscando a la persona.”

Cortez también está entusiasmada con la participación de los padres. A solo unas semanas del inicio del año escolar, los padres de Pugh ya han establecido una nueva PTO, trayendo energía de regreso a la comunidad escolar. “Ya estamos en marcha con café con la directora”, dijo. “Los padres me dicen que sienten que son bienvenidos de nuevo.”

Cortez describe su trabajo como una pasión y una vocación. Ya sea caminando por Memorial Park o recorriendo los pasillos con datos de los estudiantes en mano, su enfoque es constante: construir una escuela donde cada niño se sienta visto y apoyado.

A un nivel más personal, Cortez habla por muchos otros educadores cuando dice: “Estamos en esto. Esto no es solo un trabajo. Esto no es solo una carrera; esta es nuestra vocación. Dios nos ha llamado a hacer este tipo de trabajo.”
