CHANNELVIEW, TX— Harris County Precinct 2 Veteran's services has a new home in Channelview. Members of the community joined Harris County Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia to celebrate the inauguration of the former VV Ramsey Community Center into the VV Ramsey Veterans Center. Attendees included VV Ramsey's granddaughter, Heather Ramsey Cook, great granddaughter, Grace Jarman, as well as local World War II veterans, and many other heroes.

Precinct 2's Veteran Services Program was first displaced in 2017 after Harvey flooded the Highlands Community Center. The program temporarily moved to Pasadena, until they were able to find its permanent location at the VV Ramsey Center in Channelview.

“I am proud to say that our Veteran Services program has a home again, and we can show our veterans – we are here to support you, and we are here for you just as you have been there for us,” said Commissioner Adrian Garcia.

For over two decades, the Precinct 2 Veteran Services Department has proudly provided assistance to US military veterans and family. Rediscovering a Banner Year, Part 2

“Leroy! Leroy! Leroy!” The chant rose into the night air as the 1974 Denver Harbor All-Stars at a backyard get-together, clapping while their old coach waved goodbye for the evening.

Last month, we shared the story of how former assistant coach Leroy Cervantes discovered the long-lost 1974 District 25 championship banner on a rubble pile and passed it to La Voz editor Carolyn Lopez. That 1974 season was historic—it was **the first time a Denver Harbor Little League All-Star team had ever won a district title**, putting the neighborhood on the baseball map.

Carolyn was a scorekeeper back in those days, and her father, Henry Lopez, was president of Denver Harbor Little League for several years. Carolyn made it her personal mission to find a home for the old banner and has set it on a path to preservation with the Houston Public Library’s Hispanic Heritage Collection.

A few weeks after La Voz shared the story of the rediscovered championship banner,

several players reunited for a simple backyard hangout—just old teammates catching up, trading phone numbers, and chatting about a season that still connects them 51 years on. No speeches, no program; just the easy rhythm of people who once shared a dugout.

Every team member had a story to tell about an out they had made, a homerun they had hit, or a slide into home base.

Back in 1974, the Denver Harbor All-Stars even crossed paths with a future NFL name. One of the powerhouse teams they beat along the way was Norhill, whose lineup included a 12-year-old Gary Kubiak—the same Kubiak who would one day coach the Houston Texans. “Our boys went through them, too,” Leroy recalled with a grin.

“We beat everybody.”

The men said a prayer in remembrance of their departed brothers, Carlton Rossio, Albert Villanueva, and Henry Torres, as well as their head coach, Arthur Gonzalez. The team wasn't able to find players Reginald Barnett and Micky Ochoa. If La Voz readers have a contact for these gentlemen, please let us know.

“Leroy! Leroy!” For the men who once wore the Denver Harbor Little League uniform, that chant said it all—five decades of friendship, pride, and memories that still bind them together. The laughter sounded like it did 51 summers ago.

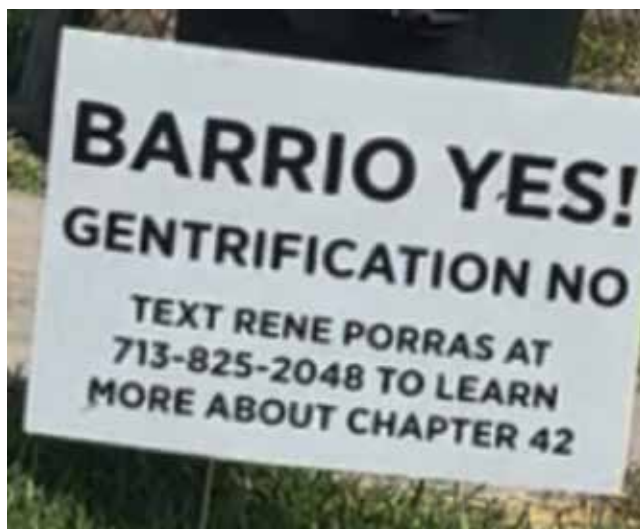

Texas DPS tightens in-person rules for drivers 79+; services expanded for homebound, bilingual seniors

After several Denver Harbor seniors expressed confusion about new Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) rules, La Voz contacted DPS to clarify what's changing — and what help is already available.

Beginning in September 2025, Texans **aged 79 and older must renew their driver's license or ID in person so that DPS can verify their vision and, when necessary, medical information.** Online renewal is no longer an option for this age group. This requirement builds on earlier DPS guidance that already encouraged seniors 79 and older to come in person.

Bilingual help on-site

DPS said every driver's license office should have access to an interpretation device (staff described it to us as a "phone talk" setup). A customer can speak into the device in their own language; the interpreter relays the question to DPS, and DPS responds through the device in the customer's language. This is intended for seniors who speak Spanish or another language and do not have a relative to translate for them.

Appointments — but ask about same-day openings

DPS driver license offices continue to operate **by appointment only.** Cancellations occur every day, and DPS staff confirmed that you can check with the information desk upon arrival to see if an earlier slot has become available.

Homebound and nursing-home seniors can be served

For elders who are **homebound, bedridden, or in a nursing facility and truly cannot be transported,** families can **call the local DPS office first.** DPS will review the necessary documents and can arrange for a DPS representative to visit the person, even taking the photo on-site. A Houston-area family shared with La Voz that DPS visited a nursing home and completed the renewal there, exactly as described. Similar accommodations for non-ambulatory Texans have been reported in past years.

What should families do now?

1. Call your local DPS office and inform them that the person is 79 years old or older and cannot come in.
2. Ask what documents they want to see first (old DL/ID, Social Security number, proof of Texas residency).
3. Request mobile/field service for a homebound or nursing-home resident.
4. If language is an issue, inform them that you will need an interpretation device when the staff arrive.

This matters because DPS is updating licenses and tightening security statewide in 2025 — so seniors will continue to be asked to prove their identity in person.

When the System Fails Our Children, Parents Must Take Action

My Journey Filing a Grievance in HISD

We are tired. Tired of protesting. Tired of going to meeting after meeting. Tired of being told “We are listening” when our children continue to struggle and fall more and more behind. We are tired of trusting a system that is supposed to help our kids... only to find out it’s hurting them.

That has been my reality as a mom in Houston ISD.

My daughter Sophie has dyslexia, ADHD, and both short-term and long-term memory challenges. She needs accommodations to learn. She deserves support to succeed. But when the New Education System (NES) rolled into our schools, everything sped up, the pace, the pressure, the expectations, and Sophie was left behind. Teachers told me they didn’t have the time or flexibility to give her the help she needed. And it wasn’t her fault or theirs. They were just following the system they were given.

For a long time, I didn’t know what else to do but raise my voice. I spent months calling, emailing, begging, and demanding change. I thought if I protested enough, someone would take us seriously. I didn’t know there was something stronger, something with real accountability behind it, something called a grievance.

When I finally learned what a grievance was, I was scared. It looked like a long process that required evidence and laws and paperwork. I didn’t feel smart enough. I didn’t feel confident enough. But I did feel one thing loud and clear: Something was wrong, and it wasn’t going away on its own. So I trusted my gut, the same gut every mother has when she knows her child is hurting. I started saving emails, writing everything down, and gathering proof. I talked to my daughter, and she confirmed what I feared: she wasn’t getting the help the law says she must receive.

I filed the grievance. I waited. I kept fighting behind the scenes. And today, I received the news:
I won.

The Texas Education Agency found HISD at fault, not once, not twice, but three times, for failing to give Sophie the services and support she is legally entitled to. Now, they are required to fix their mistakes for Sophie and any other child this has happened to.

That is the power of a paper trail.
That is the power of a parent who keeps pushing.
That is the power of not giving up.

So here is what I want every parent to know:

- Ask your child questions. They notice more than we think.
- Do not settle when something feels wrong.
- Document everything. Follow up every in-person talk with an email.
- Learn the grievance process. It exists for a reason.
- Hold this system accountable, because our kids are the ones paying the price.
- We pay taxes. We show up. We love our children more than anything. That gives us the right, and the responsibility, to demand better.
